RE Curriculum Overview 2024 - 2026

We follow the new RE Syllabus for Walsall pupils, which establishes what is taught in RE in Walsall schools and provides practical guidance for teachers. The syllabus depicts how pupils develop RE subject knowledge and understanding. The curriculum includes the skills of investigating religions and world views through offering pupils varied experiences. The curriculum topics allow our pupils to reflect on and express their own ideas and the ideas of others with increasing creativity and clarity. The RE syllabus supports our pupils in becoming increasingly able to be reasonable in their responses to religions and world views.
